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THE FIRST MINI-DICTIONARIES IN ESPERANTO (1887-1890)

AN ORIGINAL MULTILINGUAL CORPUS FOR COMPARATIVE AND INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH

Abstract

During the first years of existence of the *esperanto* language (1887-1892), many different texts have been published by its promoters. Among them, published separately or included in textbooks or presentation brochures of the *lingvo internacia*, 37 documents in at least 16 different languages were prepared by Zamenhof himself or by early adopters of Esperanto, in order to present the new "international language" to the broadest possible public. This unique multilingual corpus is scattered across many national libraries. We have systematically collected digital versions of this set of documents and begun to analyse them in parallel. Many of them (17) contain the same basic dictionary, elaborated by people who mostly had a limited, or absolutely no knowledge of philology. These 17 dictionaries encompass about 920 entries in Esperanto, each time translated in a given target language. We are progressively digitizing the whole corpus of these small dictionaries (so far, 12 versions have been digitized and encoded) and aim at making it accessible to scholars of various disciplines in an Open Access repository.

INTRODUCTION

During the first years of existence of Esperanto, (1887-1890), its creator, the Warsaw ophthalmologist Ludwik Zamenhof, as well as his early followers, published many texts to promote and put in practice the ideal of a *lingvo internacia*, a neutral language for international communication (Korzhenkov, 2009)¹.

Though Esperanto, as the new language was soon named, never became the universal standard for international communication it was meant to be, it is still in use worldwide. Esperanto is the only constructed language that has not disappeared several years after its birth, as *Pasilingua*, *Volapük*, *Ido*, *Langue bleue* and many other similar projects did (Haupenthal, 2013). The esperantists, albeit few in number, continue to promote the ideal of a neutral language for international communication: the Universala Esperanto-Asocio (UEA) is on the list of non-governmental organizations officially recognized by the United Nations, and many books and texts have been written or translated - and published - in Esperanto during the 133 years of existence of the language.

We intend to make a contribution to one of the less studied aspects of the early history of Esperanto (approx. 1887-1890), by documenting the diffusion of the first descriptions of the new language in natural (mostly European) languages. After having gathered electronic facsimiles of many of the first documents published by the movement, we could identify a specific corpus: the first Esperanto-target languages dictionaries. Dictionaries were obviously a strategic tool for the diffusion of the new language: Zamenhof published the very first one (around 920 entries) together with the first brochure released in June 1887. This small unidirectional (Esperanto-Russian) dictionary had, curiously, a long career, despite its limited scope. It was adapted, translated, or reprinted 17 times between 1887 and 1890², and made available in 15 different target languages.

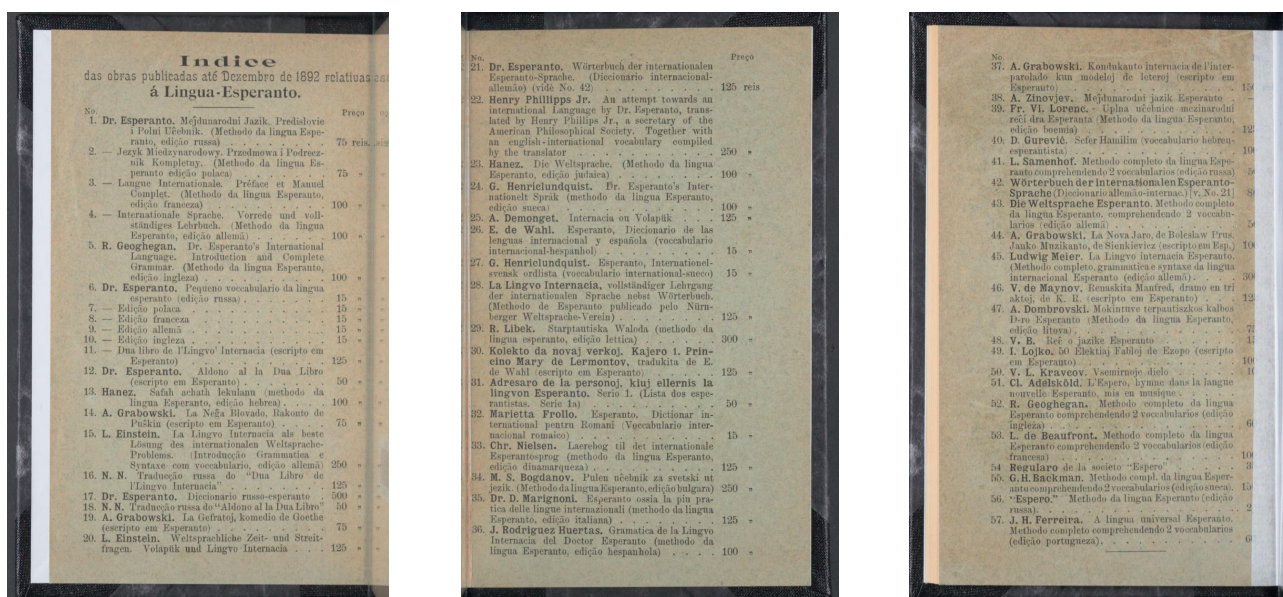
2. The 920-roots *vortaro* was re-used, probably for the last time, in 1893 (Esperanto-French textbook, de Beaufront 1893, ESN 53), though at that time much more complete dictionaries had been published.

The objective of the present paper is to present this corpus of early dictionaries, and to discuss the possibilities of further research and systematic online editing of their contents. Some examples of the full-text digitization are provided for 12 of these dictionaries.

1. THE CORPUS OF EARLY PUBLICATIONS OF ESPERANTO: TOWARDS A SYSTEMATIC CATALOGING

The early Esperantists publications are far from constituting an unknown corpus. Actually, from the very beginning, the leaders of the movement established, and maintained throughout decades, a detailed catalogue (Fig.1) of approved publications (below *Nomaro*³), all of them being assigned a serial number (below *Esperanto Serial Number* or ESN)⁴.

But this list is only seemingly complete. 2 documents, published in 1888, soon disappeared from the *Nomaro* and were replaced by new publications. The history of the replacement is well documented (Korzhenkov, 2009, p.89). Initially, a young medical student from Warsaw, Julius Steinhaus (1865-1922), an acquaintance of L. Zamenhof, volunteered for the preparation of a quick English translation of the initial text. *Dr. Esperanto's International Tongue* was published with a corresponding dictionary in January 1888 (see Table 1, items 5.1 and 10.1). But the translation was exceedingly bad, and Zamenhof decided to withdraw and destroy all stored copies. During the year 1888, an Oxford philologist, Richard Geoghegan, prepared a new translation of the same text, entitled *Dr. Esperanto's International Language*, and of the corresponding dictionary (Table 1, items 5.2 and 10.2); both were released in January of the next year.

Where the *Nomaro* shows only 57 items, by including the two early items translated by J. Steinhaus, we reach on our side a total of 59 works published.

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The Austrian National Library (*Sammlung für Plansprachen* — Department of Planned Languages) has gathered a unique collection of these early Esperantist publications. Still, it holds only 40 out of the 59 items. The 19 others are scattered in many national and public libraries, sometimes not easily accessible, and, in the worst case, are not traceable at all. There is therefore no *complete* collection of early books and documents of the Esperantist movement anywhere in the world. Of course, these documents have never been considered together and even less systematically compared⁵. Our idea is to fill that gap, and to collect systematically electronic versions of all locatable documents.

The first phase of our research (2019-2020) implied several steps:

1. identifying and cataloging all the items of the corpus (including the missing ones)
2. downloading scanned copies of all available original documents
3. ordering scanned copies of rare items stored by national libraries but not available in digital form (Vienna, Jerusalem, Sofia, London, Lisbon, Madrid, Copenhagen)
4. making direct pictures of an exemplar in a library (one case, Lyon).

Step 1 resulted in the building of a small bibliographic database, called by us *Nomaro-expanded*. We recorded all the characteristics of the 59 Esperantist items published from 1887 until 1892 (Table 2).

Steps 2 to 4 resulted in the retrieval of 49 items out of the total 59 (in facsimile or reprint form). So far, 8 items (ESN 17, 28, 38, 41, 50, 51, 52, 55) are stored in public libraries and need to be scanned upon request (Oxford, Stockholm, Saint-Petersburg, Vienna, Moscow). Four more items (ESN 42, 48, 49, 56) are, for the moment, out of our reach. ESN 42, a 1889 German-Esperanto dictionary disappeared during the war⁶, while the remaining three are unknown publications (we only now their titles, corresponding to Esperanto Serial Numbers 48, 49, and 56).

5. Such an archive did exist before World War II. But all the documents gathered by Ludwik Zamenhof in Warsaw, stored and preserved by his family after his death (1917), were destroyed by the Nazis in 1939. The documents that were collected and published later in Japan by *Ludovikito* (Ito Kanzi) in his series *Ludovikologia Dokumentaro* are far from being complete, and often lack basic bibliographic indications.

2. DOCUMENTING THE EARLY INTERNATIONAL DIFFUSION OF ESPERANTO THROUGH THE FIRST DICTIONARIES (1887-1890)

2.1 Multilingual aspects of the early diffusion of the Esperanto project

The usual history of the diffusion of Esperanto is centered on the development of the language itself (main characteristics, concurrence with *Volapük*), or on the key people (Zamenhof and the early adopters), and tells the story of the progressive organization of the movement (Korzhenkov, 2009, 2011). To sum up, these approaches are generally diachronic. The beginnings of the movement are typically described from 1887 (the *Genesis* momentum) up to 1905, date of the first World Congress in Boulogne-sur-Mer. 1905 is also the year of publication of the *Fundamento de Esperanto* by L. Zamenhof, a text immediately adopted as the unique authority over the language by the Congress participants.

On the contrary, our research is based on a synchronic comparative analysis of the first publications describing the project and the language to the international audience. The idea is to document the global diffusion of the project by analyzing simultaneously the publications that were released in many languages shortly after the birth of Esperanto.

From this perspective, the years 1887-1890 are of crucial importance. The international diffusion of Esperanto can be explained, among other factors, by the very quick translation/adaptation of the initial brochure in many languages. Indeed, the first brochure describing the project of *lingvo internacia*, a short booklet, soon nicknamed *First Book* (*Unua Libro*) by the early Esperantists, was released almost simultaneously in Russian, Polish, French, and German (June—November 1887), and completed by four corresponding small dictionaries (Esperanto-target language). The sole author/translator of the 1887 documents is Zamenhof, who was a distinguished polyglot. The following year, four new brochures were released. The *First Book* was translated into English by Julius Steinhaus, and then in Hebrew and Yiddish by Naftali Najmanovich, two Warsaw acquaintances of Zamenhof (January—September 1888) and, at the end of the year, the first systematic textbook (for German speakers) was published in Germany by Leopold Einstein, an adopter from Nürnberg. The following years, many adaptations of the initial brochure were released, targeting people from different nationalities. By the end of 1890, a total of 36 booklets, textbooks or dictionaries aiming at presenting Esperanto to the international public had been published⁷, in 16 different languages (Table 3).

dictionaries had already been published in 1889 (including between 2000 and 3000 roots)⁹, the original small vocabulary continued its international career. We identified a total of eighteen documents published between 1887 and 1890, where the initial 920-roots *vortaro* is present. For logical reasons, we exclude the second Esperanto-German *vortaro*, published in Nürnberg by Leopold Einstein in 1888 (it is a simple replication of the 1887 German *vortaro*), thus reducing our corpus to seventeen items (Table 4).

9. The Esperanto-Russian dictionary, with more than 3000 roots was released in January 1889 (ESN 17); and the Esperanto-German dictionary with around 2000 roots in February of the same year (ESN 21)

3. DIGITIZING WORK: METHODOLOGY AND RESULTS

To sum up, this set of documents has the characteristics of a parallel corpus that deserves specialized analysis, for instance by linguists. Such analysis is far beyond the reach of the present paper (and of the author). Though, we have made a consistent preparatory work for a later systematic encoding and for further analysis of the present material by scholars of different disciplines. Our objective is to make this corpus available to every interested scholar, regardless of the discipline. This material could be used in varied fields such as linguistics, interlinguistics, cultural history, etc.

But, in order to make it exploitable, we can not simply point to the catalogues of the libraries where the different *vortaroj* are stored (as indicated in Table 4). We know from direct and recent experience that gathering these copies can be an long process, that would cost anyone time, energy, and finally money. That is why we want to capitalize on our work (and on the remarkable collection constituted by the Austrian National Library) to offer a wider audience a structured output of this research.

After having systematically collected scans of the first *vortaroj*, it became obvious that a next step would be necessary. It is for instance legally impossible to deposit all these image scans in an Open Access Archive: there are varying limitations set by the different libraries to a public use of these digital versions. Some of them are already online, but many documents are subject to reuse restrictions. Besides, these document are in image format and are therefore not always easily readable, not to mention the linguistic heterogeneity of the corpus. On the other hand, the **textual content** of these documents **is in the public domain**.

That is the reason why we decided to carry out a full-text digitization of as many documents as possible. We created a simple uniform template for all dictionaries with 4 columns and 924 lines (Table 5):

1. Uniform code number; below [ID] for all Esperanto entries found in these dictionaries, from [1] to [924]
2. Original spelling of the Esperanto word in the first *vortaro* ever published (Esperanto-Russian, 1887), below [Esperanto ESN 1–1887]
3. Spelling of the Esperanto word the current *vortaro*, below [Esperanto ESN 35–1890]
4. Entry in the target language

We first encoded the four 1887 *vortaroj* (Russian, Polish, French, German). This helped us to solve methodological problems. For instance, we decided to make an edition as faithful as possible to the original. We adopted a general principle for our digitizing work: to achieve a **diplomatic edition** of all these documents. Original spellings are respected (outdated German spelling, old-

style Russian, among others), and typos are reproduced without correction. The Russian *vortaro* is an interesting example (Table 6). The 1887 document uses pre-revolutionary spelling (called *old-style spelling* in Russia). Instead of modernizing the entries (as in column 4), we kept the original (column 3).

But the best example is the *Vortaro por Angloj* (Dictionary for English speakers) published by J. Steinhaus in Warsaw in 1888. This document is notoriously full of English mistakes (see p.2). We reproduced them systematically. If one compare one of Steinhaus' translations, with the equivalent work done by R. Geoghegan, the interest of the diplomatic edition is obvious (Table 7). In that specific case, J. Steinhaus invented the word **frather** (instead of **brother**).

Other dictionaries posed difficult problems. The most challenging was the *Vortaro por Izraelidoj* (ESN 23) — Dictionary for Yiddish speakers. The document is a rare combination of different languages and scripts. One may find on the same page and sometimes in the same entry:

- two writing directions (European and Hebrew)
- three alphabets 1.2.3. and four languages a.b.c.d. : 1. Latin (a. Esperanto – b. Polish), 2. Cyrillic (c. Russian), 3. Hebrew (d. Yiddish)

Usual word processors or spreadsheet software are not adapted to such a complex situation. We decided to use a specific word processor, *Mellel*, that allowed us to create multilingual tables of excellent quality¹⁰. In the end, a simple copy-and-paste (from Mellel to Excel) allowed us to create a .csv file.

To sum up, as of April 2020, we could fully digitize twelve different *vortaroj* (Table 9), and partially the Hebrew one. Some results of this work are displayed below (Table 10, p. 11).

4. RESEARCH PERSPECTIVES

There are two main perspectives for this research.

4.1. Digitizing the remaining 5 *vortaroj*

- So far, we have fully digitized 12 dictionaries in 10 languages (Table 9). We do not speak all these languages: specifically, our skills in Swedish, Italian, and Czech are close to zero. But for these three languages the digitizing work was rather easy, the scanned copies being of good quality, and our knowledge of related languages having helped us to decipher correctly the originals.

- For similar reasons, the next possible step would be the digitizing of the Romanian (ESN 32) and Bulgarian (ESN 34) dictionaries, a work we could carry out ourselves with limited supervision by a native speaker.

- The last three *vortaroj* pose more complex problems. The dictionaries in Hebrew (ESN 13), Latvian (ESN 29), and Lithuanian (ESN 47) cannot be digitized in full-text without expert help.

1. Hebrew: we have done some preliminary work on that *vortaro*, but this work needs expert supervision. By partially digitizing this dictionary, we specifically intended at identifying words or short sentences written in Yiddish (introduced by the author for exemplifying the Hebrew translation in a language more familiar to the Jewish readership of the late 19th century). We could document such Yiddish translations for all entries: Najmanovich completed 905 entries (out of 921) of his dictionary with Yiddish examples (Table 11).

The full digitizing of the Hebrew would imply further steps. An indispensable prerequisite is a new high-resolution (minimum 300 dpi) scanned copy, since the file at our disposal does not allow us for instance to read diacritical marks (*niqqud* and *dagesh*) with certainty, or to remove ambiguities between some letters (typically ך and כ). Besides, this work should be completed by a person with adequate skills in Hebrew. The late-19th century Hebrew used by Najmanovich is far from being the contemporary standard, so we would like to involve a scholar with a sufficient knowledge of *fin de siècle* written Hebrew.

2. Latvian: the document at our disposal is a low-resolution B&W scan, difficult to decipher (like the Hebrew dictionary). Furthermore, the pre-1918 Latvian spelling used is not the modern standard: it was then close to German, with no use of diacritical marks like in the contemporary language. Besides, the text is printed in a difficult-to-read *Fraktur* typesetting.

3. Lithuanian: the pre-1918 Lithuanian used is not the contemporary standard. Same remarks as for Hebrew and Latvian apply: a cooperation with a scholar having the required linguistic skills is indispensable.

4.2. Encoding the *vortaroj* according to the TEI standards.

The last step of this work is a systematic encoding in a format recognized by linguists, such as *Text Encoding Initiative* or TEI. A collaboration with specialists is a prerequisite. We already have begun to share our sources, metadata and the digitized *vortaroj* with Francesca Frontini (Praxiling, University of Montpellier), a researcher in computational linguistics.

Francesca Frontini and Denis Eckert have elaborated guidelines for a further common work:

„*The next step in the project is the conversion into TEI, using the lexicographic module. In creating the data model we have adhered as closely as possible to the guidelines of TEI-lex0 (Bánski et al., 2017). The TEI version will faithfully describe the content of each vortaro, with precise metadata information about the original edition; at the same time it should allow and facilitate the exploration of the collection, by means of an interlinguistic alignment of each lexical entry as well as by enriching the corpus with explicit linguistic information, such as part of speech.*“

A proposal of TEI modelling has been elaborated by Frontini, and a preliminary test made for two *vortaroj* : French – ESN 8 (Annex 1), and German – ESN 9 (Annex 2).

5. CONCLUSION

The encoding of the *vortaroj* is the first step of a more comprehensive project. The early years of Esperanto constitute a remarkable moment of creation of an universalist contributing project in the age of “First Globalization” (Berger, 2003). It should be therefore systematically documented.

The project is to achieve, in the long run, the systematic full-text encoding of all the early works (1887-1893) of the Esperanto movement, and make their contents accessible online in a standardized format, thus avoiding the difficult question of the copyrights issues related to image-scanned items belonging to national libraries. This corpus would then be accessible to a great variety of scholars (in History, Linguistics, Digital Humanities, Cultural Studies, etc.), allowing them process this corpus with their respective methods, in many possible thematic directions.
