The latest revision has been particularly justified by the new developments in genome editing techniques, especially the wide use of the CRISPR-Cas technique, and with T-cells. Gene therapy medicinal product (GTMP) is a legal sub-category of medicines among Advanced Therapy Medicinal Products (ATMPs). However, medicinal product containing genetically modified cells (GMCMP) is not explicitly mentioned as a legal sub-category under EU regulation n°1394/2007 on ATMPs. Nevertheless, both GTMPs and GMCMPs should be considered as ATMPs under European Union Law. On the one hand, quality issues have been raised for all ATMPs regarding the reproducibility of the manufacturing process given the variable character of the starting materials. On the other hand, there is an overlap in the scope of the aforementioned guidelines when medicinal products containing genetically modified cells are to be considered gene therapy medicinal products. 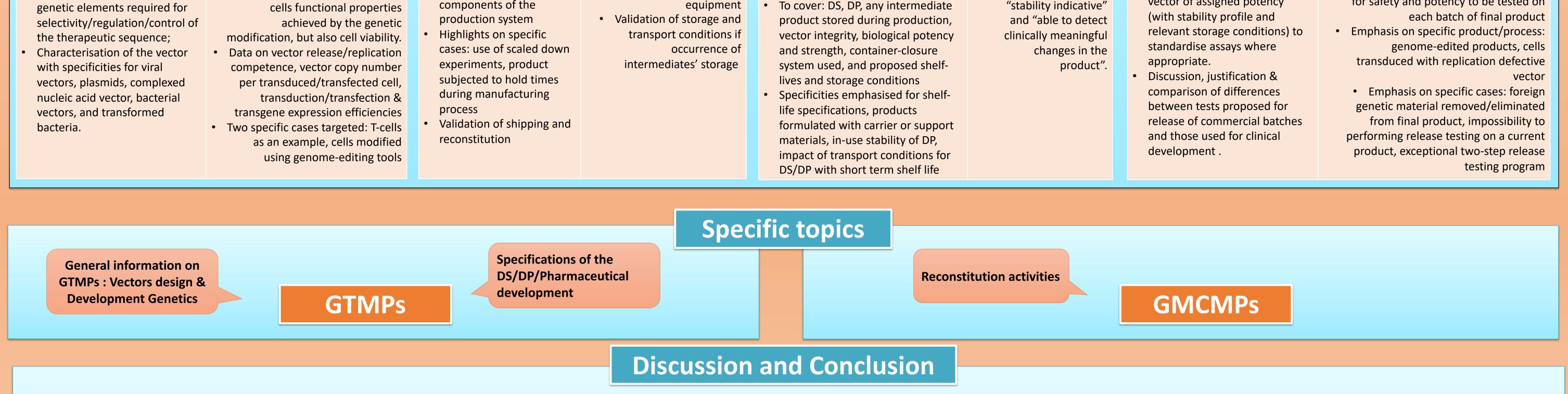

More general approaches for GTMPs than for GMCMPs

- Starting Materials: tests to be conducted depend on product & production process (i.e. genetic manipulation for GMCMPs)
- Manufacturing process: While the GTMPs text distinguishes manufacturing process and process controls of DS and DP, the GMCMPs text focus on cell preparation and culture, and genetic modification as main manufacturing step although further steps are also considered.

• Quality controls: Possibility to use reference batch for GTMPs assays standardization seems not possible for GMCMPs targeting distinct product/process/case

• The main difference between the two texts is that the GMCMPs text is more detailed than the GTMPs one regarding comparability studies

Process validation as the topic with most differences

• One of the most significant differences is that "reconstitution" is not part of the manufacturing process to be validated for GMCMPs by opposition to GTMPs. It is only mentioned 3 times in the GTMPs text while it is a dedicated specific section for GMCMPs.

Link between characterization & release criteria

• It appears there is a close link between characterisation and release criteria, but it is explicitly mentioned only in GMCMPs text.

Specifications highlighted for GTMPs only

• The GTMPs text has sections dedicated to the specifications of DS, DP, and pharmaceutical development. However, specifications appear disseminated within the GMCMPs text. Interestingly, the word "specification" appears only 3 times in the GMCMPs text, and 2 times only in the quality part for "release specification" regarding changes in the manufacturing process of recombinant starting material, and characterization.

2) While GMCMPs can be both GTMPs or CTMPs, the GMCMPs text refers more to the guidelines on Cell-based MPs than to the GTMPs text



Reference to the Cell-based MPs text & not to GTMPs text regarding characterization, process validation, and stability studies • Reference to both Cell-based MPs text & GTMPs text regarding manufacturing process
