Productions as evidenced by vessels stuck to one another as a result of an uncontrolled temperature during firing, first firing wasters, tripod stilts and distorted bowls



Pottery Workshop of Famagusta (end of the 15th-16th c.)









Pottery Workshop of Nicosia, Arkipiskopi Excavation (F. Hadjicristofi) (13th-14th c.)

Local ceramic production as shown by the presence of tripod stilts, kilns bars and over fired pottery



Pottery Workshops of Paphos (13th-14th c.)

Local production attested during the 13th century as evidenced by finds of first firing wasters, tripod stilts, glazed wasters and kiln debris in Lemba and throughout Paphos - in particular in the Hellenistic Theater of Kato Paphos excavated by the Universities of Sydney and Avignon.









Nicosia Fabric

The fabric is different from that used in the workshops of Paphos at the same period. The earth used in the workshop of Nicosia is limestone clay, which is hard and contains red, white and black inclusions. After firing, its colour varies from beige to orange.




Paphos Fabric

It is a clay rich in iron. The hard fabric is a dark red fine, easily turning grey when over-fired.




Slip Painted Wares from Paphos Workshops 13th century










