Research question and focus

 General focus of the COVICARE project: the changes introduced by the pandemic for home care workers for the elderly

+ At the national level in France and in other countries (Pascal Caillaud, Virginie Guiraudon, Clémence Ledoux) + on workers and employers at a French subnational context (Marie Cartier, Marion Gaboriau, Eve Meuret Campfort)

- The policy measures :
- > The health measures adopted at the national level for elderly care workers (masks/ protocols/ vaccines)
- the national financial measures (to compensate for lost wages during lockdown or illness (lay offs « chômage partiel ») / bonuses (« prime Covid ») in 2020 and 2021 in France / wage increases)
- The organisationnal measures (creation of a fifth branch of the social security regime)
- The appproach: Welfare state policy analysis (1) who get what, financed and governed by whom?/2) which practises prescribed / 3) when) (Daly et al. 2022) looking at the dynamics of inclusion and exclusion (Van Hooren 2018; Pulignano 2019)
- Question : how to characterise the different policy changes concerning home care workers during and after the pandemic and how to explain them?

We emphasize the lobbying role and intermediary role of **employers' organizations** in a fragmented sector with evolving and blurry government announcements. Cf business power analysis (Baccaro and Howell 2017 ; Mercille and O'Neill 2021)





Research context and method

- The research and data collected for this paper is part of the COVICARE project : Perspectives comparées des effets du Covid sur les politiques et les professionnels du care auprès des personnes âgées en perte d'autonomie à domicile
- Documentary data collection
- Systematic press review covering the February 2020-december 2022 period
- Monitoring of the publications of the national stakeholders (web sites, newsletters, formulars etc.)
- Monitoring of laws, decrees, collective agreements, impact reports or implementation studies
- Semi-structured interviews with 20 national policy actors (administrations, trade unions, employer's organisations at national level), observations of events they organised (on zoom or after the pandemic)

1. Context : a fragmented home care sector before the pandemic

Fragmented actors separated from the health sector who negotiated fragmented collective agreements

1. Context : a sector seen as unreformable characterised by bad employment conditions, labour shortages, and turnover before the pandemic

- Numerous reports calling for LTC reform since the mid-2000s
- Limited impact of the last LTC reform (2015)
- Emmanuel Macron's promise to introduce a big reform of the LTC
- Strikes in the LTC sector (2018)
- El Khomri report in 2019 highlighting labour shortages and turnover interpreted as a lack of attractiveness of these jobs.





2. A relative inclusion of declared home care workers in the access to public ressources..... but with delays and differences in terms of amounts

- Priority for the masks (but less and different masks than the health and nursing workers)
- Bonuses (but less than in nursing homes and in the health care sector)
- Priority for the vaccination
- > Wage replacement

BUT always after the health professions and the workers of the nursing home

4. The lobbying role of employer's organisations in giving access to rare public ressources to home care workers

Example : Mobilisations around the COVID bonuses.

May 7, 2020, The Ministry of Health and Social Affairs announces the upcoming payment of a bonus for nursing homes, without mentioning homecare workers

=> the homecare employers' federations mobilize

- May 11, 2020 a press release of the Ministry indicates that "This bonus [for the Ehpad] will also be paid in the provider services of home help"
- => BUT the workers employed by the households are excluded
- May 13, 2020, a press release from the National Council for Social Dialogue of the Individual Employer and the President of the FEPEM (ie Trade Unions + Employer's organization): "This bonus would be a sign of equal recognition and treatment for employees who have been working every day since the beginning of the pandemic, with the same self-sacrifice and the same concern for taking care of the most fragile of our fellow citizens"





5. Measures preserving the interests of the employers

- Welfare state financed measures (masks, bonuses, vaccines, wage replacement) which could reach the workers because they were declared
- Limited obligations or efforts of put on the shoulders of the employers
- Preservation of the employer's discretion in the implementation of the measures.

5. Measures preserving the interests of the employers
Preservation of the employer's discretion in the implementation of the measures.
Masks distributed by the providers organisations (after the 27th of march)

- Some room of manoeuvers in 30% of the departements for the employers in the definition of the groups eligible to the bonuses (CNSA 2021)
- Implementation of the wage increases in the non profit sector : at the discretion of the employers who had to reclassify the workers
- LTC minimum hourly payment for providers (=23€/h in 2023) but at the discretion of the employer to transfer it to the workers

Which can be explained by the role of the employer's organisation and the french political system (lobbying + structural power + ideational power)

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6. What did the pandemic left to the sector?

1) The reform of the LTC

(reform adopted in december 2023 within the adoption of the planned annual budget of the Social Security (LFSS))

1.1.The reform created an **obligation for the local authorities to pay the providers organisations at a minimum hourly level** (which increases by decree each year : 22€ in 2022, 23€ in 2023) (ie structural reform)

 \Rightarrow a way to recognise the value of the workers...

 \Rightarrow But,

- No obligation for the employers to transfer it to the wokers
- No obligation for the providers to set the price at 23€, they can ask more to the beneficiaries

The narrative about the importance of the workers structurally benefited to the organisations

1.2. Introduction of a mechanisms of tenders for providers organisations in order to obtain a complementary budget (3€/h) financing certain actions like

- Providing services at night or during week ends
- Bettering the working conditions of the workers
- Intervening in remote territories
- Councelling unpaid carers

1.3. A reform which leaves out the situation of employment by the families and of proxy agencies, accompagning the families with their administrative duties as employers

Perpetuation of the fragmentation of the sector





6. What did the pandemic left to the sector?

- The aknowledgement of home care workers employed by providers- as frontline and essential workers
- ⇒ When new scare resources had to be limitively distributed (petrol to the cars, in automn 2022), they were in some departements recognised as having priority.
- ⇒ Organisation of home care workers claiming their essentiality (The self organised group "la force invisible des aides à domicile" which splitted, another self group was created, "les essentielles du lien")
- ⇒ Visibility of these home care workers in the public arena, also with the help of some journalists / politicians

Conclusion : the regulations covering nationally home care workers during the pandemic in France

More protections than in many other countries

(not true to say that these workers would have been forgotten or invisible in France)

- \Rightarrow The declared home care workers were materially recognised as second line workers and
- \Rightarrow benefited to general protections for the workers
- Fragmentation and differences according to the nature of the employer during and after the crisis

(home care workers employed by households excluded from some protective rights, workers employed by for profit firms with no wage increases)

- Limited obligations or efforts of put on the shoulders of the employers
- Preservation of the employer's discretion in the implementation of the measures and in the long run
