mobilized to propose more sustainable mobility services adapted to these areas. However, their need to rely on a better understanding of mobility needs and current mobility practices. This knowledge remains partial due to a real difficulty of setting up statistical databases in rural areas.

The key question is then how to characterize car dependency of people living in sparsely populated areas.

Method

Definition of sparsely populated areas : the French case







- Different geographical realities : peripheral areas of metropolises, isolated rural areas or villages Different methods to define rural areas
- → Using the definition of the French Statistics Institute (INSEE) based on Eurostat results = 2 types of sparsely populated territories :

* sparsely : 50% of the population living in communes with a density < 300 inhabitants per km^2 * very sparsely : 50% of the population living in communes < 25 inhabitants per km^2

- 33% of the French population (EU : 27%, Switzerland : 18%, Belgium : 18%, Germany : 23%, Italy : 25%)

An asserted or chosen car dependency?

- A car dependency widely cited in the scientific literature
- A reflex or a non-reflexive use?

Considering the average trip : 12 km in sparsely populated areas :

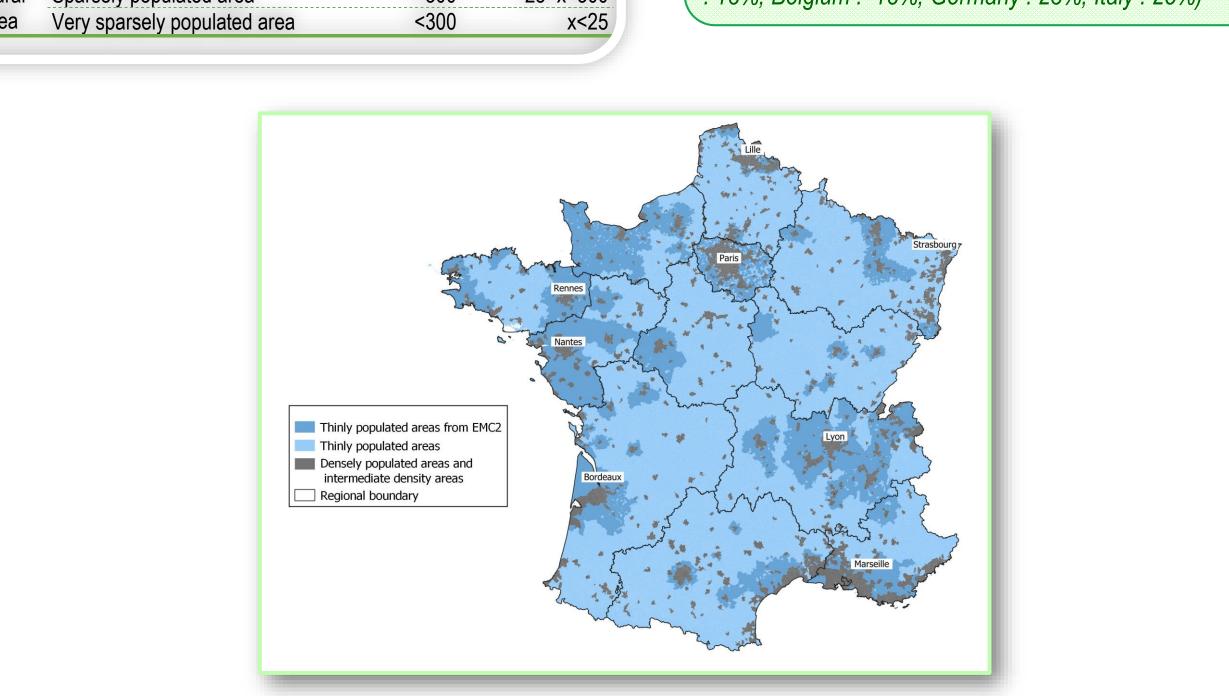
- A distance ruling out the alternative of walking
- Bicycles : a possible alternative.... With safe cycle routes!
- And PT alternatives? Diversity of situations

* low-density areas are less well covered and served by PT : only 25% of these areas are part of an urban transport perimeter with some PT services;

And when they are, 40% of them are part of small intermunicipal structures that are still thinking about setting up mobility services adapted to their territory

* Rail services? 30% of rural communes and 45% of rural population under the influence of a rail service





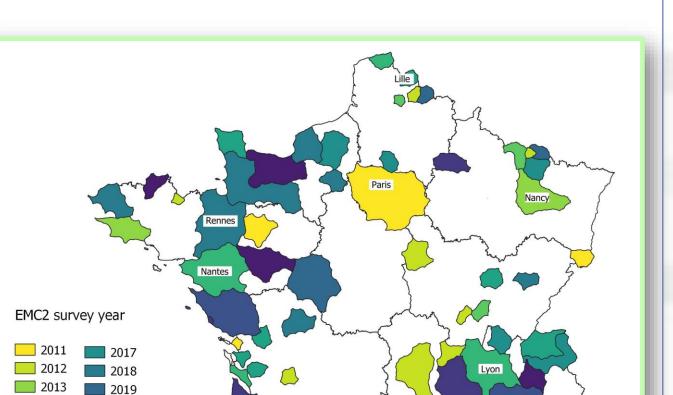
Specific analyses of 2 databases on daily mobility to give orders of magnitude

1st database (EMC2 base) : a set of 69 household travel surveys carried out in large and mediumsized conurbations between 2011 and 2022 and based on a national methodology : the EMC2 surveys

(for more information see www.cerema.fr)

- concerns weekday journeys made by people the day before the survey

- 1,765,000 gross trips of which 26% are



Mobility profiles in sparsely populated areas : multimodal VS exclusive cars users?

According to the frequency of modes use : 89% of people living in rural areas are not exclusively dependent on car use

* Less than 1% of them never use the car, either as a driver or a passenger \rightarrow they walk or take PT * 25% never use the car as a driver \rightarrow they walk or travel by car as a passenger

In sparsely populated areas, 2 main multimodal mobility behaviors models = 70% of multimodal people * car + walk

* car + walk + cycling

* And PT = the third mode after car and active modes in sparsely populated areas

Conclusion

- Car dependency in sparsely populated areas results from either a constraint or an asserted choice;
- A degree of dependency depending on profile of people;

2nd database (EMP base) : a French national mobility survey lead in 2019

- both daily journeys and long-distance travel - a total sample of 13,825 individuals surveyed, including 4,842 people living in low-density areas - 12,687 trips made in low-density areas

Regional boundary

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- Aspirations of people in rural areas to have alternatives to the car (the "yellow vest" movements in 2019);
- An urgent need to transform mobility in rural areas : a double challenge
 - * reducing car dependency in sparsely populated areas :
 - Implementing mobility services adapted to these areas (shares mobility, rural mobility as a service, self-service bicycles,...) and to revitalize small railroad lines.
 - Bringing about sociological change (habits, social norms,...)
 - * but also acting for mobility of vulnerable population (with financial and/or physical constraints)
- A complex double challenge
 - * no single model of mobility solutions for these areas * implementing a package of mobility services

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
